▲ SHEFFIELD BUSINESSES KEEN ON GOING GREEN

Sheffield delegates have given upcoming technologies in environmentally friendly vehicles the thumbs up at a seminar.

The Green Fleet Management Best Practice Seminar gave business leaders, fleet, transport and environmental managers first hand insight into the technologies of the future, including a vehicle powered completely by electricity.

Delegates were excited to learn the technologies for such a vehicle are not far away and many felt it a viable option.

Organisers of the seminar, supported by the Care4Air campaign, were keen to introduce local businesses to the environmentally friendly technologies of the future, but also show them current options.

Stewart Marsden, National Transport Manager for a division of BT and Dennis Chapman, a Service Manager for BT Fleet took the opportunity to try out the latest low emission vehicles including the Toyota Prius Hybrid Vehicle, which was launched in January.

Stewart said: "We found the seminar very interesting, particularly the new technologies like the completely electric vehicles. At BT we have many environmental policies in place and it seems that a low or zero emission vehicle could be the next evolutionary step."

Bernd Hoermann of Sheffield City Council's Environmental Protection Service said: "Encouraging companies and organisations with large fleets to take up green fleet management, by for example using low emission vehicles, is key to our air quality action plan for the city.

"We are very excited by the new technologies and want Sheffield to benefit from them, and the seminar is a great way of bringing them to the attention of Sheffield's business and fleet managers."

He continued: "Our promotion of green transport initiatives will not stop at the seminar, we have also launched Sheffield's first Green Fleet Network ensuring we continue to hold these valuable seminars which promote and share good ideas and good practice in green fleet management. This is vital to keep the ball rolling, encouraging businesses to look at their green offer, which will ultimately improve air quality for everyone.'



▲ Car Care

Care4Air, the campaign to improve air quality in South Yorkshire, has released tips for car owners to promote the idea they can save time and money whilst helping to keep the air clean.

Care4Air want people to use their car more efficiently, and consider alternative modes of transport.



Care4Air is a partnership between Sheffield City Council, Doncaster Metropolitan Borough Council (MBC), Rotherham MBC, Barnsley MBC and South Yorkshire Travelwise. The campaign highlights initiatives within the region's 4 Air Quality Action Plans. It aims to reduce air pollution in South Yorkshire by raising awareness of air quality issues and encouraging people to reduce unnecessary vehicle use, become energy efficient and use newer, more environmentally friendly technologies.

Mark Daly from Care4Air said: "There are so many ways that car owners can help reduce air pollution, whilst saving time and money. Simple steps like planning

journeys, rather than going on individual errands, have an impact on vehicle emissions. Avoiding non essential journeys at peak times, keeping vehicles well maintained and following simple rules at the petrol pump can also help keep the air clean. Small changes to the way drivers use their vehicles can help the environment, and save people money at the same time."

Top Tips So Motorists Can Care4Air

- Drive more efficiently, keep within speed limits, and always use the highest gear traffic conditions allow
- Avoid rapid acceleration and heavy braking, both lead to greater fuel use and more pollution.
- Avoid using your car for short journeys, walk, cycle or use public transport instead.
- Make a single journey rather than lots of short ones, as fuel is wasted every time you start up the car.
- Try to car share whenever possible.
- Maintaining your car regularly also helps reduce emissions and save you money, as badly maintained cars tend to use more fuel and produce more exhaust fumes.
- If you see an excessively smoking exhaust from a lorry or bus, take down the vehicle details and time and place you saw it, then contact the national smoky vehicle hotline on 0870 6060440.

▲ Care4Air Award Winners 2004

A successful Sheffield based air quality-monitoring project has become the first winner of a Care4Air Award in Sheffield, the award recognises individuals. organisations and companies for their contribution towards improving air quality. Members of the East End Quality of Life Initiative and Tinsley Forum, based in Tinsley, have been presented with the Award by Jan Wilson, Sheffield City Council Leader.

The Care4Air campaign was launched in Sheffield at the same time.

Tinsley Forum and the East End Quality of Life Initiative began monitoring air quality using simple test tube size equipment in April 1998, enabling local people to take an active role in finding out about air quality in the area. The tubes are exposed to the air for one month, and then sent for analysis. They measure the amount of Nitrogen Dioxide in the air, which mainly comes from road transport. The tubes are placed near people's homes, as well as by the roadside, where air quality frequently exceeds government targets because of exhaust emissions.



Doncaster Award Winners

The success of the Tinsley initiative has led to the study being extended to cover other parts of the City, including Park Hill, Burngreave, Heeley, Hackenthorpe, Gleadless, Neepsend, Foxhill and Broomhill.

Jan Wilson, Sheffield City Council Leader said: "I'm delighted to present the East End Quality of Life initiative and the Tinsley Forum with a Care4Air Award. Their work and commitment to their community really makes a difference and contributes towards the council's

targets of a cleaner and greener Sheffield."

Mark Daly of Care4Air said: "The East End Quality of Life Initiative and the Tinsley Forum is exactly the kind of projects that deserves recognition. The community have come together to take action on air pollution, which damages the environment and contributes to health problems. It's great to see that the Tinsley project has encouraged other schemes to start up across the city. Locally run air monitoring empowers the community and gives them a real voice in issues that directly affects their quality of life. I would encourage any community or residents group that wants to undertake this simple yet effective monitoring to find out about air quality in their area, to get in touch with the Care4Air Campaign."



Care4Air is being launched across South Yorkshire, with further Care4Air Awards being presented to a Barnsley school who run a walking bus service, a Rotherham community group who have helped organise a community bus that works like a taxi and Doncaster Royal Infirmary for their transport policy that includes a community bus.
