Running, cycling and rollerblading were just some of the ways Meadowhall staff got to work on Friday 4th June 2004, when the Centre held its travel to Work by Public Transport Day, in support of the Care4Air campaign.

Over 70% of Meadowhall Centre employees and many of the staff from the Centre's 270 retail units left their cars at home for the day, in an effort to educate people about the environmental benefits of reducing the number of cars on South Yorkshire's roads.

The Centre also pledged to donate £10 for each member of staff taking part. to the Future Forests Project, a charity which is committed to planting forests across the UK and indeed worldwide.

Mohammed Dajani, Meadowhall Centre Director, comments, "Air quality is a big issue today in the UK and we are very keen to be supporting the Care4Air campaign, which is aiming to raise

awareness of this important subject across South Yorkshire.

I was delighted to find out how many staff left their cars at home for the day, and I hope it will prompt some people to consider the advantages of public transport on a more permanent basis. I chose to travel to work by bus and Supertram, but I was very impressed with some people's more imaginative choice of transport!"

Air Quality Website

Television personality Bill Oddie visited South Yorkshire to launch the Care4Air website. The site contains information about air quality in the region, and advice about how to keep the air clean.

Bill took a whistle stop tour around South Yorkshire, stopping at the village of Rossington in Doncaster, where air quality has been improved. He visited a local couple, Mr and Mrs Jones, who helped clean up the air by transferring to smokeless fuel.

Bill then travelled to Tinsley, in Sheffield, where residents have come together to investigate their local air quality. This work is particularly important in areas that are near very busy roads, because vehicle emissions cause air pollution. In Tinsley, local people have worked together and set up a network of small air pollution monitors. They are using the results to empower the communities and are also working with the local

councils to improve air quality. In the evening Bill officially launched the Care4Air website at the Showroom Cinema in Sheffield. He spoke about air quality and introduced a video of his day in South Yorkshire.

▲ SHEFFIELD RESIDENTS URGED TO START THINKING ABOUT WINTER NOW!

With temperatures reaching their 30's, summer might not seem like the right time to be thinking about heating homes, however, two city organisations are urging Sheffield people to take steps now to make sure they are prepared when the frost comes.

Warm Front and Care4Air in Sheffield have joined forces to encourage more residents across the city to apply for a Warm Front grant, which are awarded to help make people's homes more energy efficient, therefore reducing heating bills and cutting air pollution.

One man who is looking forward to a winter of warmth is seventy-four year-old Tony Roberts of Stocksbridge, who recently received a grant worth £2500 for improvements to his house thanks to the scheme.

Mr Roberts learned he was eligible for the grant when he received a letter from Sheffield City Council. After applying an energy advisor visited his property to assess which measures were needed. Warm Front paid for and organised the work to be done, up to the maximum amount of the grant.

The work was then allocated to a contractor, who carried out the installation. Mr Roberts home is now ready for any blast of cold after he had a new boiler fitted, floor pipes

replaced, a new cylinder to replace an old tank, cavity wall and loft insulation, and draught-proofing for the front and back doors and windows.

Mr Roberts said: "I am thrilled with the work that has been done. I find it cold in my home in the winter, so I thought it was a good idea to have the work done now. I can already feel the difference too, there is definitely less of a draught in the evenings.

"Not only is it great news that my heating bills will go down and I will be kept warmer in winter, it is also good that I will be helping reduce air pollution, you never really associate air pollution with keeping your home warm!"

When power stations that supply homes with electricity burn fossil fuels, they pump out gases including carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. In the UK, one quarter of all carbon dioxide emissions come from the energy we use to heat and light our homes, and to power household appliances.

Thanks to the Warm Front scheme in Sheffield there was a reduction of 52.210 tonnes of carbon dioxide emitted into the atmosphere last year. Mark Daly from Care4Air said: "When heat escapes it reduces the energy efficiency of your home. This means you have to use your heating more, which in turn gives rise to more pollution.

"The Warm Front scheme is great news for Sheffield. Surprisingly the average home emits more carbon dioxide than the average car, and the fact that Warm Front has helped reduce carbon dioxide emissions by over 52,000 tonnes last year alone is a definite step in the right direction."

The Warm Front scheme, in association with Sheffield City Council, offers free grants worth up to £2,500 to home owners and private tenants who receive certain income or disability related benefits or credits.

The scheme is aimed at people aged over 60, families with children under 16, expectant mothers who are over 26 weeks pregnant, the disabled and residents suffering from a long-term illness.
